The premiere took place on 18 May at the Kiel Opera House in 2013. The opera was commissioned by the *Theater Kiel* and by support of the *Ernst von Siemens Music Foundation*. For the one-act opera Wolfgang Haendeler wrote the libretto

based on the chess story by Stefan Zweig. The performance is in German language and with German surtitles.

Cristóbal Halffter, one of the most important composers of our time, once again created a masterpiece of modern music, which has been skilfully realised by the music director Georg Fritzsch and by the general director Daniel Karasek.

Cristóbal Halffter is a Spanish composer, born 1930 in Madrid. His music often covers topics such as oppression and violence. On behalf of the United Nations in 1968, he wrote the cantata *Yes, speak out, Yes* to the 20th Anniversary of the promulgation of human rights. In 1995 he wrote for the Dresden Philharmonic in remembrance of the victims of the bomb attack the *Memento a Dresden*. Halffter is a member of the European Academy of Sciences and Arts in Paris and holds Honorary Doctorate degrees from the universities Leon and Madrid. Halffter 1976 conducted for the first time in Kiel. In 2006 came his opera *Don Quixote* for the German premiere at Kiel. With this production Halffter was completely satisfied and on occasion of the 100th Birthday of the Kiel Opera House in 2008 the premiere of his next opera *Lazarus* was held there. Halffter's current opera *Schachnovelle* is a tribute to Stefan Zweig. This opera is an honoring of the grandiose Austrian writer. Halffter has given his best.

The librettist **Wolfgang Haendeler**, born in 1968, studied at the university in Erlangen, German philology, dramatics and philosophy. He was chief dramaturg in Kiel until 2008. Since 2011 Haendeler is senior dramaturg at the Musiktheater Linz in Austria.

theaterZeit is a supplement of the newspaper *Kieler Nachrichten*. In the May 2013 issue the woodcut Schachnovelle 2013 by the artist Elke Rehder was published for the first time. The woodcut is a reminder of the death of Stefan Zweig on 23 Februar 1942 in his exile in Brazil. Stefan Zweig is best known for his novella *The Royal Game* (Schachnovelle), his last work before he committed suicide.

Schachnovelle 2013 - my new woodcut has an image size of 22.7 x 11.7 cm, printed on a sheet size of 31 x 20 cm. The total edition of the black and white woodcut is 350 signed copies. The hand-colored woodcut is in an edition of 100 numbered, titled and signed copies.
